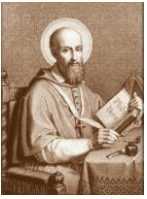

Pope Benedict XVI said that those seeking "true liberty" should follow the example of a 16th-century French saint who urged the faithful to give themselves up completely to God's love. The Pope said St. Francis de Sales believed and wrote that "divine love is the reason for all things" and that his views, which were influential during his lifetime between the 16th and 17th centuries, were still relevant today. "In an era like the one we are living, that seeks liberty even with violence and trouble, we can't help but see the relevance of the words of this great master of spirituality and peace." Pope Benedict said St. Francis' total love for God inspired him to write important works, including the "Introduction to the Devout Life" and "Treatise on the Love of God," in which he stresses the "universal call to holiness."

The Pastor's Workshop

In regards to Respect Life Sunday, here are a few words about the **Miracle of Life** that I came across which were written by Sr. Melannie Svoboda.

Life is a miracle. The fact that it even exists is a miracle.

Scientists say the chances of life, as we know it, ever occurring were highly improbable. Why? Because conditions had to be perfect for life to "happen." Take the location of our planet. Earth resides in what scientists call the "Goldilocks Zone." Earth's distance from the sun means it is neither too hot nor too cold to support liquid water, a key ingredient of life. Thus, earth's location is "just right."

Earth's orbit is also "just right." It is circular and not elliptical, thus avoiding extreme variations in temperature that would have prevented life from occurring. Earth's size facilitates life too. Its gravity is "just right" to retain an atmosphere essential for life. That all these variables – location, orbit, size, atmosphere - are "just right," is, indeed, a miracle.

There are more miracles, too. Take diversity. Earth is home to 100 million unique species of living things. 100 million! Amoebas, daisies, ladybugs, bees, salmon, wheat, oak trees, chickadees, blue herons, turtles, otters, aardvarks, dogs, cats, polar bears, elephants, whales. There seems to be no limit to our Divine Creator's imagination.

And what about human life? More miracles abound: our brains have 100 billion neurons that direct our ability to walk, talk, wonder, work, learn. We are also capable of forming relationships and, most important of all, capable of loving - not only our own family and clan but strangers, people far away, and generations yet to be born.

Another miracle: the Incarnation. Jesus, the Author of Life, became human, walking our roads, drinking our water, gazing up at our stars. Jesus taught that life was a precious gift to be nourished and shared. Thus, babies must be welcomed, and children must be cherished and educated. All individuals must be respected, relationships nurtured, injustices addressed, disagreements negotiated, the marginalized drawn in, the hungry fed, the imprisoned visited, the sick nursed, the dying accompanied with tenderness.

Yes, life is a miracle, a precious gift pouring forth from our Creator's love. And we give thanks for this miracle by reverencing life in all its splendor and beauty.
